A Safety Short

The skidder operator released the cable and dropped the skid of logs behind him as he saw me walking up the hill. He hollered at me to come over as he staggered down the steps of his machine. If you have ever gotten anything in your eyes that you couldn't get out, it can become pretty scary. You become disorientated, and it hurts! Your vision gets blurry and all you want is to have whatever is in there be removed. That was the case this day. This operator was pulling double duty and was also cutting trees without any eye protection. As he came around with the saw, he inadvertently filled his eyes with the chips flying out of the back cut. I flushed his eyes and was able to remove a majority of it. I sat him down and continued to flush it and was able to remove what we figured was the rest of it. He returned to work a short time later. His eyes continued to tear up and flush out any remaining dust, but he was miserable. It could easily have been prevented with a simple pair of safety glasses or a face shield on his hardhat. Why take the risk when it is so easy to prevent it? Keep yourself and your employees safe by setting the example and requiring your people to follow your lead with eye protection. At some point you will be very glad you did!

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How Many Credits Do I Need?? How Can I Check My Credits?? We are almost finished shifting everyone to an 8-credit, 2-year renewal cycle. If you became a SHARP logger in 2020 or last renewed your status on 1/1/2021, then you still must earn 12 CE credits for your 1/1/2024 renewal. Everyone else must earn 8 CE credits every 2 years. Everyone must take the 3-credit, required SHARP Logger Update Class in every renewal cycle. The number of CE credits you need is printed above your name on the mailing label. If the label says "Update Needed" then you have not attended the required SHARP Logger Update Class and need the Update before you can renew. Even if you have more than enough credits, you must take the Update. The label will also show your renewal date. If it says your credits are due by 1/1/2023 then your SHARP logger status has expired and you must earn the required CE credits by the end of this year or else you will have to retake the Core Program to become a SHARP Logger again.

You can also check your credits, Update status, and renewal date on the website (www.sharplogger.vt.edu), by typing your last name (only) in the "check credits" box at the top of the page. If your record does not come up, either your SHARP status is expired or there is an error.

Virginia's Hardwood Initiative

Oaks get a lot of attention in hardwood management, and rightfully so. They are the cornerstone of most hardwood forests, consistently have value, and are necessary for many game and non-game wildlife. In short, they're awesome. But many oaks are declining, and they need regenerated. What makes for good oak regeneration?

Oaks regenerate successfully through large, advanced regeneration. Their acorns grow in the fall (White oaks) or spring (Red oaks) after hitting the ground. Then, they spend years growing a large root system while the stem grows slowly. Once the seedling gets to be six feet tall and is nearly an inch in diameter at the ground, it's ready for lots of light and to compete into the canopy. Even if it were cut, it would resprout strongly to compete against other fast-growing trees like Yellow Poplar, Sweetgum, and Black Cherry. Foresters like to see at least 350 oak seedlings per acre like this to successfully grow another oak forest. The large advanced regeneration needs to be in place before harvesting timber for the oaks to be successful.

Large, advanced oak regeneration isn't present in most hardwood forests. There isn't enough light for the seedling to grow into large regeneration in a closed canopy forest with a mid-story. The right amount of light needs to get to the oak seedlings on the forest floor, but not so much that faster growing, light loving trees overtake them. To get the right amount of light, you normally need to remove the mid-story and a few trees that are just poking into the canopy. This practice is called Mid-story Removal, and helps small oak seedlings get enough light to grow into large advanced regeneration that can compete successfully into the canopy.

Talk to your forester about how and when to do Mid-story Removal. It's needed in lots of forestland, and some landowners and foresters are looking to have it done.
